

Celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Moon Landing

This summer marks a half-century since man first walked on the moon. Here's the story from the other side -- the Russian side...

RED MOON RISING IN THE EAST is a one-man play by award-winning Virginia playwright Dwayne Yancy. It is based on the life of Sergei Korolev, the mastermind of the Soviet space program. Because his name was a state secret in the Soviet Union, he is virtually unknown in the West, but he is almost single-handedly responsible for the space race — he launched the first satellite, the first animal into space, the first satellite to the moon, the first man in space, the first woman in space, and many other space firsts long before the Americans. Korolev was a visionary engineer who was first jailed under Stalin's purges for his experiments, and then released when Stalin understood the need for a missile program. Korolev died tragically, in 1966, and the Soviet moon program died with him. Running time: 90 minutes.

Red Moon Rising made its debut in 2009-2010, with performances in Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Virginia. It is being revived to coincide with the 50th anniversary of the Moon landing - July 20, 2019. The program is limited to 30 performances between June 15 and August 31, 2019.

The program is performed by Roanoke actor Gary Reid; his own one-man show *A Life of Sorrow - the Life and Times of Carter Stanley* has been performed 90 times in 15 states and 3 Canadian provinces.
